Bownanza 2010

We will start set up sometime during the week before Bownanza (days and times to follow in the July Puffs). As we did last year, we will have Exotic animals on 2 courses, North American animals on 2 courses, 1 moving target on each course, several novelty shoots all 3 days, and concessions. "BLOCK TARGETS" Used at Range

Please be advised if you use a "Block" or similar target to sight in your broadheads at the range, you are responsible to clean up after yourself. In the past, members have put their "Blocks" in the sand pits; leaving a mess from the pieces of "Block" laying all over. Also, please do not dig out the sand and set your "Block" into the sand pit. People who have done this in the past have caused allot of sand



to spill out the front of the enclosure and left the sand on the ground and the "pit" in a mess. Please put your "Blocks" in front of the sand pits or off to the side so other members don't have to clean up the sand. Your mother doesn't live here so remember to clean up after yourself. Thanks.

The Western Classic Trail Shoot and NFAA Marked 3-D Championship

It was held over the weekend of May 6th - 8th in Redding, CA. Don and I left on Wednesday morning, stopping in Harrisburg, OR to visit the Spot-Hogg factory. Arriving at Spot-Hogg sometime before noon, we got a tour of the entire facility where they machine make all of their sights in house and then assemble. 'Pretty Cool'.

We made it to Redding later in the day and went straight to the club to shoot a couple of arrows. Motor homes and trailers were all over the place with people camping right there at the range. Maybe I'll think about doing that next year.

Action started Thursday with the Pro-Am Blind Draw while a bunch of archery manufacturer booths set up for viewing and purchase of archery stuff. The weather was sunny and the temps were in the upper 80's to low 90's with Saturday and Sunday expected to be a bit cooler, thank God. I felt like I was melting on Friday. Shooting in Washington on overcast days with temps around 35 to 55 degrees is one thing. It is tough to acclimate yourself when the temp goes to 90 degrees in Redding!

Sydney and my parents were expected to arrive late Thursday night staying at a different hotel. So Don and I woke up early Friday morning to pick her up and head for the club. The 3 of us started on target #18 with 14 other shooters, mainly from the West Coast. The format was 25 targets Friday and Saturday, 20 targets on Sunday for a total of 70. We would shoot 2 arrows per target (just like our Safari) and 1540 possible points. Shotgun starts at 8am all three days. Don and Sydney both had stellar performances on Friday with me letting that thing between my ears get the better of me that day. After Friday's shooting, we all went back to the hotel to go swimming instead of browsing the archery booths. Swimming in the pool with Sydney was good for me in order to ease my concerns about my not so great start of the tournament. After this (***continued on page 2***)

CRB board Minutes May 12, 2011

Start time 6:30 pm

Members present: 14 board and 1 proxy vote/ 2 regular

Treasurers Report: Finances of the club discussed.

Membership: Recruitment has slowed down, as of now there are 120 paid members. Open house shooters day (June 4th) addressed and motion for hotdogs and chips passed for open house.

Range Masters Report: Target numbers have been added on "C" & "D" courses. Preparing for NWTC . Need to acquire more gravel for Range. Some needed on B10 and around containers. We have had 3 work parties, still some to do, hope to be done in June.

Tournament Chairman Report: IBO this weekend. 20 target practice round on Saturday and 40 target flighted round on Sunday. June is the Extreme shoot and July is Bownanza. Porta-potties need to be serviced.

Bowhunting Chairman Report: May 18th applications for special hunts must be in.

Puffs Editor: Need stories by the 25th of every month to make them into the Puffs.

Old Business: New generator is ready for service.. Flyers for the Extreme shoot and Bownanza addressed. Door prizes, money dots, and seminars for Bownanza addressed. It was decided and a motion made that the Bownanza prize committee (consisting of Jim Walker, Edo Gebeninni, Patrick Siever, Scott Chavis, and Don Mahler) will establish the tournament venue and decide on the logistics for this shoot, passed.

A motion to change the "workhorse" party to the club on June 17th 2011 at 6 pm, passed. The waiver regarding Tony Zyskowski (a handicapped person) being able to use a crossbow at the club and only on the flat range was discussed and the waiver passed. 10 yes, 3 opposed, and 1 abstention. A sign will be posted at The Flat Range and an article in the Puffs regarding this waiver..

New Business: CRB shirts and hoodies were discussed and we will have an inventory for the Board to review prior to our next purchase. CRB club keys need to be made; Patrick will meet Mike and get the club key machine and key blanks and make some keys up for Mike. A motion to allow Mike Wallace (who built the stairs for B2) shoot the next 3D for free, passed. The President stated that all Board members must respond to e mails concerning club business. The portion of the By Laws and Standing Rules regarding amendments were amended by the Board to read "...may be amended or waived by a two-thirds (2/3) **affirmative** vote of the full Board of Directors...".

The Board will vote on the minutes for the April meeting at the June Board meeting since they were not available at

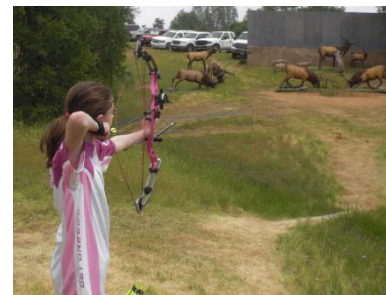
this meeting.

(Western classic Trail Shoot & NFAA Marked 3-D championship continued from page 1) attitude adjustment, Saturday went well for me with Don and Sydney keeping pace with the top competitors in their divisions.

Saturday night I received a call from a buddy saying that the officials had Sydney posted in 2nd place in the Cub Male Free Style division. This was obviously wrong since she is supposed to be in the Cub Female class. The closest competitor in her class was some 80 points behind her. We woke up early Sunday to head for the club to fix the mistake. I didn't sleep a wink thinking they might not fix it and Sydney might have to stay in the Cub Male class. Thank God it was fixed early in the morning on Sunday.

Sunday went well for the three of us with Don stepping it up and only dropping 7 points to my 9. Sydney had the National Championship in the bag as she had another solid performance to end the day. Don Mahler shot a 1509 out of 1540 in the AMBHFS (pins) to earn him 3rd place in the Nation and my daughter, Sydney, was crowned National Champion in the Cub Female Free Style division with a 1455.



This was both Don and Sydney's first time competing in a national tournament and they both kept it together all weekend. Congratulations to both of them!

I ended up in 30th place in the AMFS (open) class with a 1491. Even though I shot well on Saturday and Sunday, you can't have one bad day and expect to place better in Redding. 'Maybe next year'. Kent White shot well all three days to end up in 11th place with a 1514.

If any of you club members ever decided to make the trip to Redding, you won't be disappointed. It is the biggest tournament in the country with anywhere from 1500 to 2000 people. I would recommend it to anybody, whether you're a competitive archer or recreational bow hunter. It truly is an experience to remember. 'See ya at the range'.

Day Two Success

My son Chris had quickly ended his spring turkey season on opening day. He was out of tags but the rest of us were aching to fill ours, too. Between us we still had five tags to fill. It was exciting to see Chris and Jared's success and that excitement motivated the rest of us to get after those gobbling fools.

It was mid-morning of opening day. The plan was for my son to continue to call for Jared, since Jared had one open tag. I would continue to hunt with Jeff since we each had two tags. All of us went back to the 165 acres of private land where the guys had taken their three birds.

It was a bit of a letdown because the place was dead except for the flock from the front roost. That flock was now split in two. The new dynamic wasn't a big deal. The problem was they were in Idaho and we were hunting Washington State. The birds were all feeding and each group had a strutting tom overseeing the breakfast activities. At some point they would come into Washington, which was their pattern. I had seen them travel the big 14-hour loop from Idaho, into the Washington timber, and back into Idaho during the previous season. Last year they would come off the roost and feed in Idaho for a couple of hours and then head to Washington. Today that wasn't happening. All we could do was drive away.

After our own breakfast, Jeff and I decided to explore the National Forest land behind the cabin. Chris and Jared headed back to the private property. During our midday exploration of the forest land we managed to strike up four gobbling toms in an area of less than a square mile. I was able to get one to come in to 60 yards where he hung up out of range. I watched him slip back into the young pine forest and hoped we'd see him again.

So that was the end of opening day I had seen enough to know I would be back for more fun and games in the National Forest. With all the gobbling we heard it was a no-brainer that this was the place to be.

So here it is day two and again it's midday. We had just walked into one area and spooked another gobbler. We were walking too fast. Of course the bird didn't stick around. We knew he was not the only one back there, so we kept moving from area to area doing a bit of calling, hoping something would holler back at one of our calls.

Finally at about 1:30 p.m., as we were slowly walking a service road, a crazy gobbler strikes us up. I wasn't calling at the time but he must have heard us coming and thought we were hens. When I returned a yelp he went through the roof. I've never heard a scream-gobble but that's what it was. He wasn't just saying, "I'm

over here, come to me." He was saying, "What are you waiting for? Get your egg-laying tail over here, NOW!!!"

The message came across load-and-clear. We dove in the timber and were lucky enough to have a little clearing where we could see his approach. There was no time for dropping a decoy so my buddy nestled in a pocket of trees and I knelt next to a tree that would allow me to see deep into the opening. I had an idea where he was and where he might show himself.

The love-starved bird continued to gobble and would cut me off with every yelp I scratched out. I tried to match his intensity when he gobbled. He would ratchet up the tone and I would do the same. After three more stanzas of box yelping he finally slipped through the trees and poked his head out into the opening.... right where my gun was aimed.

He fell right where he was standing, about 30 yards off the end of my barrel.

This bird didn't follow the rule book. Hens are supposed to go to the toms. A mature tom wouldn't act like that. His paranoia would have made him wait for the hen. This guy was only interested in love and any fear he had was set aside on this sunny afternoon.

So, tell me, who rules the roost? She does, at least in this case. My little "hen in a box" convinced this boy that he needed to do what he was told...and he obeyed. I suppose this is typical behavior of a young bird. Thank God for two-year-olds!

Well, he wasn't a great big bird and he sure didn't have much for a beard, but it just goes to show that even the little ones can be full of spunk. If every bird I encounter has as much gas in him as this guy had I'd be happy with that. I'm there for the excitement, and that's what I got.

What were the keys to my success? First, Jeff and I didn't give up when things got quiet. Second, we adapted. We headed for a new area where we knew there were talking toms. Third, we kept that bird cranked up. He was excited when he found us and we kept him that way with the highly emotional calling we threw at him. He was yelling at us to come to him and I was yelling right back for him to come to us. Last of all, we didn't throw away the midday hunt when the longbeards are on the prowl.



Our season was moving along quite fast. Here it was, just day two and half of our tags were filled. Could it get any better? Well, it did. Day three proved to be one with highs and lows but it certainly finished on a high note.

Membership News for June 2011

At the May Board Meeting the board approved a special waiver granting a crossbow waiver to Tony Zyskowski. Tony suffers from a genetic condition known as Brittle Bone disease otherwise known as Osteogenesis imperfecta (OI). People with this condition have bones that break easily, often from mild trauma or for no apparent cause. Multiple fractures are common, and in severe cases, can occur even before birth. Milder cases may involve only a few fractures over a person's lifetime. Tony is confined to a wheelchair for mobility.

Below is the language of the waiver. To pass the waiver, a 2/3's affirmative vote of all board members was required. The vote was 10 to pass, 4 negative and 1 abstention. Please note Waiver Criteria #4. If you are around while Tony is shooting, please restrain your curiosity about his crossbow so as to not jeopardize either he or you.

This article is one element of the Communication stipulation, item two, signs at the Flat range have been posted. This waiver has been granted for one individual only for the remainder of the membership year. At the end of the waiver period the board must evaluate the effectiveness of the waiver criteria and whether or not CRB wishes to continue with a handicap crossbow waiver situation. If you have thoughts or questions on the subject please speak to a board member, also make it a point to attend the January 2012 board meeting to express your ideas.

CROSSBOW WAIVER

The CRB Board of Directors has granted Tony Zyskowski a waiver to shoot a crossbow on CRB property.

Communication stipulation:

An article will run in the Puffs and a sign explaining the criteria of the waiver will be posted on the road side wall of the Flat Range if we vote to allow a waiver of the crossbow rule.

Follow through requirement:

1. Grant a limited use waiver for the remainder of the CRB membership year(until 12/31/2011), at that time the waiver automatically expires. However, the board reserves the right to review this waiver at anytime. Renewal must be preceded by an evaluation as to the effectiveness of the waiver criteria.

2. At the time of renewal, the board must make an evaluation of the waiver permit criteria and decide if we want to have future handicapped potential opportunities.

Waiver: criteria:

1. The waiver is granted only to the named individual(Tony Zyskowski), for the remainder of the 2011 membership year.
2. The waiver will only be granted if the handicapped person is granted a specific crossbow handicapped permit by the WDFW.
3. The waiver applies only to a crossbow and bolt legal for hunting use as defined by WDFW. Bolts used must have an appropriate tip for Flat Range use.
4. The waiver requires the handicapped individual to have an assistant who will be able to handle the equipment, but not shoot the crossbow. *No other individual may handle or shoot the crossbow.*
5. The waiver only grants shooting of the crossbow on the Flat Range.

Summer League:

Summer league shooting started on Tue, May 24th. Each week a different course will be flagged; there will be two chartreuse ribbons for each target. One shot is a bit longer, the other somewhat shorter. Some are designed to be challenging and some more open just to keep you honest guessing distance. Courses A and C are unmarked yardage, B and D are marked (B is usually setup for a Field round white face black center, D usually is the Hunter round black face white center). Just to keep variety, we will use marked yardages, but again, I'll set out the shooting position.

Field and Hunter rounds call for 4 arrows per target, but we will only do two as we have limited light availability in the evening.

Scoring will be 5 - 4 - 3 score cards will be in a box at the Flat Range.

The flags will be up for a few days, so if you can't make it Tue evening you will still have the unmarked opportunity for a few days.

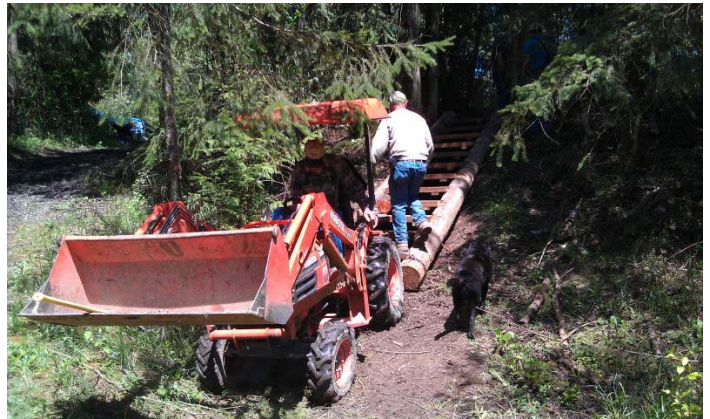

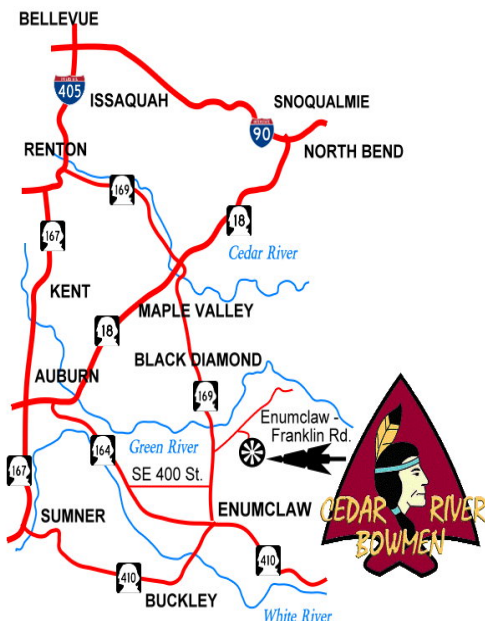
